MINISTER'S MUSINGS

“After the Sabbath, at dawn of the first day of the week, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary went back to look at the tomb.

“There was a violent earthquake, for an angel of the Lord came down from heaven and going to the tomb, rolled back the stone and sat on it. His appearance was like lightning, and his clothes were white as snow.” The guards were so afraid of the angel that they shook and became like dead men.

“The angel said to the women, “Do not be afraid, for I know that you are looking for Jesus who was crucified, he is not here; for he is risen.” (Matthew 28:1-6)

These are the opening verses to Matthew’s account of the resurrection. It is a text filled with power: “violent earthquake” and “lightning.” It is also a text filled with emotion: “they shook and became like dead men” and “fear” filled them.

As we celebrate Easter this year, I would like to point out that this day of celebration is a day of power and emotion. Who among us could ever express, like the gospel writer, the joy and glory of the resurrection? The powerful victory that we celebrate at Easter is the most significant event in all history, and as the angel said to the women, “He is risen.” That statement alone carries so much power.

Think about it for a moment: Without the message of Easter, humanity would be lost. Without those few words we would have no gospel, no assurance of immortality, no enduring faith in the Kingdom of God, and no church to continue the remembrance of Jesus Christ.

But we do have that message! We have this message from the angel who spoke to Mary in the dawn of the day which was to change the world forever: “He is not here: for he is risen!” What a powerful moment for all of humanity!

So how will we, almost two thousand years later, react to this message of the angels on Easter day? Will we “shake and become like dead people”? Or will we be joyous participants in the resurrection event, glorifying God to all we meet? We do this so that others may hear and accept Jesus into their lives and that the message of Christ victory over death may be passed on to others who do not believe.

Embrace this powerful message and carry it with you wherever you go. Let it be a part of your lives not just on Easter Sunday, but every day of your life. Let the emotion of Easter carry you to new heights of understanding and glory in the church. And may God be with us all as the angel comes into our lives saying, “He is not here. He has risen!”

2010 13th Annual \$1 Million Giveaway To Fight Hunger

For the 13th consecutive year, Alan Shawn Feinstein will divide \$1 million among hunger fighting agencies nationwide using it to help them raise funds during March and April, 2010.

The more donations made to the Greene Area Churches Food Pantry from March 1st to April 30th – the more of the Feinstein money we will receive.

Only donations or pledges received from March 1st to April 30th, and from use of the Feinstein challenge, should be counted. These donations can include cash, checks and food items (valued at \$1.00 per item or pound) or pledges, as long as they are obtained ONLY from use of this challenge.

The Feinstein million dollars will be divided proportionately among all agencies complying with the above (a minimum of \$250 and a maximum of \$40,000 to participating agencies). Checks are mailed to each participating agency by August 1st, 2010

Feinstein's \$1 million challenges to fight hunger have raised a record \$940 million for agencies nationwide. All donors who donate toward this campaign are partners in the most successful grassroots campaign to fight hunger of all times. That is something you all can take pride in!

The Greene Area Churches Food Pantry has participated in this challenge for the past few years. For 2009 our challenge was to exceed \$4,000 in food and money donations. You met the challenge and the total was \$4,604.31. We feel this challenge to our community was well worth the efforts. We thank all who participated and made this a successful challenge. Let's meet the challenge again for 2010.

He Lives!

**He is not here: for He is risen as He said.
Come see the place where the Lord lay.
Matthew 28:6**

I always find it interesting when I come across the history of a beloved hymn. As we complete Lent and enter into the Easter season the hymn He Lives, is one of the favorite Easter Sunday songs sung by most denominations. I take this story from the book, *101 More Hymn Stories* by Kenneth W. Osbeck.

**Author and Composer – Alfred H. Ackley,
1887 – 1960**

“Why should I worship a dead Jew?” This challenging question was posed by a sincere young Jewish student who had been attending evangelistic meetings conducted by the author and composer of this hymn, Alfred H. Ackley. In his book, *Forty Gospel Hymn Stories*, George W. Sanville records Mr. Ackley’s answer to this searching question, which ultimately prompted the writing of this popular gospel hymn:

He lives! I tell you, He is not dead, but lives here and now! Jesus Christ is more alive today than ever before. I can prove it by my own experience, as well as the testimony of countless thousands.

Mr. Sanville continues:

Mr. Ackley’s forthright, emphatic answer, together with his subsequent triumphant effort to win the man for Christ, flowered forth into song and crystallized into a convincing sermon on “He Lives!” His keenly alert mind was sensitive to suggestions for sermons, and sermons in song. In his re-reading of the resurrection stories of the Gospels, the words “He is risen” struck him with new meaning.

From the thrill within his own soul came the convincing song – “He Lives!” The scriptural evidence, his own heart, and the testimony of history matched the glorious experience of an innumerable cloud of witnesses that “He Lives,” so he sat down at the piano and voiced that conclusion in song. He says, “The thought of His ever-living presence brought the music promptly and easily.”

The hymn first appeared in *Triumphant Service Songs*, a hymnal published by the Rodeheaver Company, in 1933. It has been a favorite with evangelical congregations to the present time.

A. H. Ackley was born January 21, 1887, at Spring Hill, Pennsylvania. He received a thorough education in music, including study in composition at the Royal Academy of Music in London, England. As a performer, he was recognized as an accomplished cellist. Following graduation from the Westminster Theological Seminary, he was ordained to the Presbyterian ministry in 1914. While serving Presbyterian pastorates in Pennsylvania and California, Ackley always maintained a keen interest in the writing of hymns and hymn tunes. It is estimated that he wrote well over 1,000 gospel songs and hymns in addition to aiding in the compilation of various hymnals and songbooks for the Rodeheaver Co. Mr. Ackley died at Whittier, California on July 3, 1960.

Blessings to all this glorious Easter season. May the music of Holy Week and Easter bless your heart and soul!

AUDIT COMMITTEE REPORT

We have audited the records and the financial reports of First Congregational Church United Church of Christ Greene, NY, for the last three years commencing on January 01, 2007 and ending on December 31, 2009.

While our audit was limited to testing the transactions and balances and would not necessarily disclose all errors, we found no evidence of significant errors or omissions.

In our opinion, the financial reports presented for First Congregational Church United Church of Christ are fairly stated.

We, the members of the audit committee have inspected the treasurer's statement of assets and liabilities, the related statement of revenues and expenses, and changes in fund or net asset balances for the prior three years that ended December 31, 2009. Our inspection was made in accordance with the Audit Program for Internal Auditors of Churches. Our review also included the tracing of the funds set aside for flood repairs. We have found the balances displayed to be correct, procedures proper, and records properly kept.

We wish to commend the treasurer, financial secretary, and members of the finance committee for their fine work during the year. On behalf of the congregation, we thank them for the gift of their time and talent.

Copies of this report should be distributed to the chairpersons of the finance and church committees, recording secretary, treasurer, pastor, and the audit committee of the First Congregational Church United Church of Christ.
