Minister's Musings

There is a special song which I remember singing years ago which I would like to share with you. It is a song entitled, "We Are the Family of God":

Chorus: We are the family of God; yes we are the family of God; And He's brought us together to be one with Him, That we might bring light to the world.

GREENE AREA CHURCHES AND LABOR DAY 2009

It is hard to believe that Labor Day is here again! The Greene Area Churches supports many programs and projects throughout the year and we need everyone's help to make the chicken BBQ tent a big success each year. There are many opportunities to volunteer your time and talents! On Friday, September 4 the food delivery arrives and men are needed to help unload. (I will know the time soon.) On Saturday, September 5 at 1pm, we will need a crew of helpers at the high school cafeteria to make the homemade BBQ sauce. On Sunday at 1pm, we will be making homemade coleslaw at the school and sheet cakes at our church. Monday morning at 7:45am, several pick-up trucks or vans will be needed to transport pies and cakes to the ball flats. At the same time, we will need a crew to get the ice, coleslaw and milk from the school. Our regular serving shift is from 8am - 10am and this involves setting up the chicken serving line and putting all supplies in place. Usually the chicken is done by 10am, so we may start serving by then. If you are unable to help that early, please come see me or Amy any time during the day to see if we need help! PROPERTY BOARD

Where there is a need there is a way—the north side handicapped door now works with the card and operates as a handicapped door. After obtaining all of the piecemeal information, it was not too difficult a fix. Two cards are programmed for this door. There have been a few instances of inappropriately unlocked north side lower door. **Key users heed this! —Please, lock the door with the key!** Otherwise, it stays unlocked and another person with a key has to come and lockup. Returning to the handicapped issue, the south side door is next on the high priority list. The front doors have received a second coat of varnish and are beginning to look better. The kitchen door needs attention on a high priority basis and we will be doing that in the next month or so.

The barn, torn down and in a heap, has to have its pieces and other junk moved for safety reasons. Boards of Property members Fred Kroncke and Charlie Hurtgam have worked a deal with our own Art De Jager to entomb or otherwise dispose of them. They will need help at the time the equipment use can be coordinated— they will be calling you.

I was optimistic of being able to issue certificates of contributions for major items such as this barn removal. More than several hundred dollars in value, it would be a decent enough tax deduction. Alas, having read IRS publication 526 it cannot be—for it is written in black and white — *one cannot deduct time or services*. Summer, low energy costs, and conservation measures have reduced our negative balance from \$12 thousand plus to \$10 thousand plus but that brings false hope since the fall and winter have big cost items coming up. Insurance is one of the biggest. However, dropping insurance is not feasible since we had a \$160 thousand series of expenditures for water damage repair just a while ago and our building is only 22 years old.

Please remember that the following must become regular practice:

- ***Lights must be turned off when leaving restrooms that do not have occupancy sensors.***
- ***Lights must be turned off after meetings, practices, and functions held in the church.***

Another World Is Possible

The Neighbors in Need offering, which we will receive on October 4th, supports the UCC's ministries of justice and compassion throughout the United States. Two-thirds of the offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries to fund a wide array of local and national justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects. Through UCCTakeAction.org, our national Justice and Witness Ministries office offers resources, news updates, and action alerts on a broad spectrum of justice issues. Working with members of the UCC Justice and Peace Action Network (a network of thousands of UCC justice and peace advocates), Justice and Witness continues its strong policy advocacy work on issues such as the federal budget, voting rights, immigration, health care, hate crimes, civil liberties, and environmental justice. Neighbors in Need also supports our American Indian neighbors in the UCC. One-third of the offering supports the UCC's Council for American Indian Ministries (CAIM). Let justice roll down like waters, and righteousness like an ever flowing stream. Amos 5:24

The Manila, Philippines news recently reported that yet another church worker, who is also the son of a pastor of the United Church of Christ in the Philippines (UCCP), has been reported missing by his family after he was arrested by police and later turned over to the military. The 35-year-old lay worker was arrested by a police team in Tangub City.

Tensions and violence intensifies in parts of the southern Philippines. Violations to the rights and dignity of persons under the presidency of Mrs. Gloria Macapagal Arroyo continue with impunity. These violations are evident in the widespread poverty, unabated corruption, and extrajudicial killings and abductions. Many of these abuses have targeted church leaders, workers and members, particularly those from the Protestant denominations.

Global Ministries asks you to join in calling for action by our government to call a halt to these atrocities. The UCC and Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) have written letters, signed on to the letters of other denominations and passed resolutions to this effect.

Filipino pastors ask that we pray that the government of the Philippines will be humane enough to stop the rampant human rights violations and extra-judicial killings.
